1. Identify and articulate my aspirational values.



3. Weave Indigenous and Western climate communications practices.



- Describe hyper-local impacts to build understanding (Greenslade et al., 2022).
- Explain the **reality**. Be **honest**. Provide tangible **solutions**.
- **Design** a collaborative, inclusive, equitable, accessible process.
- Use **trusted messengers**: universities, friends, family, affiliations (Prairie Climate Centre, 2023).
- Identify shared future goals based on shared values e.g. our safe community (Bennett, 2023).



4. Bridge Western and Indigenous Leadership Theories.



In the Breath of Life Theory of leadership, "diversity among people can be accounted for by thinking of culture, time, and context operating ... in the same way that the vibrations do in <u>string theory</u>, diversifying the manifestation of the relational worldview principles at the level of individuals and groups" (Blackstock, 2011, p. 8).
